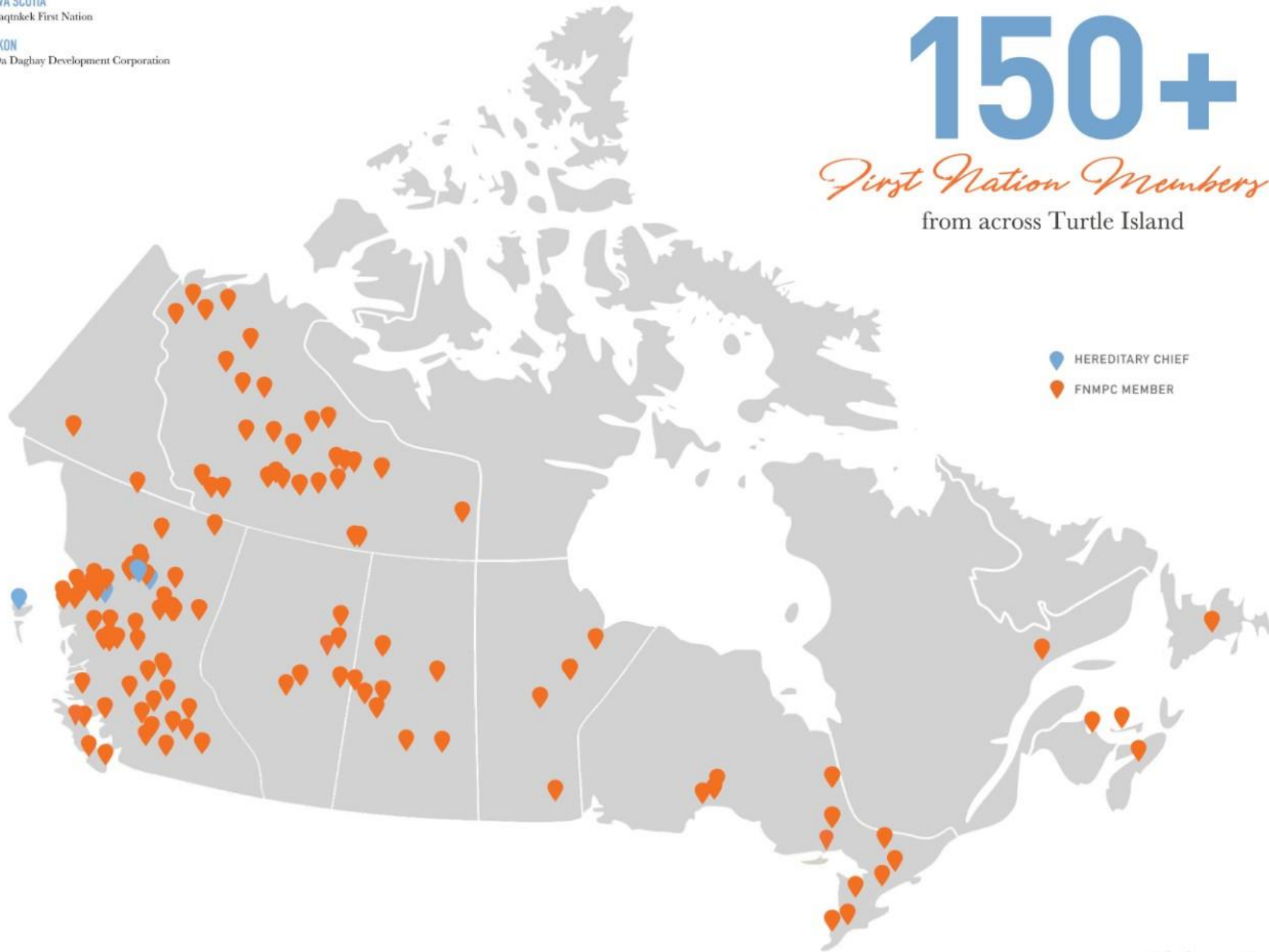

The FNMPC provides a range of services to its First Nation members to support informed decision-making on major projects that are of \$100 million in capital cost or more.

These services include:

- Legal advice
- Business negotiation and commercial structuring support
- Navigating regulatory requirements
- Environmental stewardship toolkits and impact assessment support
- Finding access to competitive capital for investment
- Convening First Nations with industry and government
- Policy advocacy
- Education ‘101-style’ on topics such as capital markets and rights-based impact assessment

OPERATING PRINCIPLES OF THE FNMPC

- **Member Driven:** The FNMPC values our members' decision-making authority on all matters.
- **Neutrality:** The FNMPC values providing independent, neutral, non-political, trusted and fact-based information to our members.
- **Unbiased:** The FNMPC values being project and industry agnostic. FNMPC will not advocate for or against a particular industry or project.
- **Non-profiting:** The FNMPC will not take a financial interest in the outcome of projects for which it becomes involved in at the request of its members.
- **Maximizing value:** The FNMPC supports our members by providing innovative approaches to overcome historical barriers that have precluded First Nations from our mainstream participation and influence in the economy.
- **Collaboration:** The FNMPC believes that we are stronger together and benefit by increasing our leverage when we all come together towards a common objective.

FNMPC MEMBERS & THE ELECTRICITY SECTOR

- **85%** of FNMPC's project portfolio is in the electricity sector, representing about \$4.27 b of capital investment
- FNMPC members have indicated their interest in exploring **equity ownership** in these opportunities
- The electricity sector is also showcasing indigenous business leadership in advancing **Indigenous led** generation and transmission projects
- FNMPC has written extensively on Indigenous participation in the electricity sector from a business, regulatory, and Indigenous values point of view

HOW FIRST NATIONS JOIN FNMPC AS MEMBERS

- FNMPC's Bylaws permit membership from Indian Act Bands, Tribal Councils, Hereditary Groups, and First Nation owned development corporations.
- A resolution signed by a quorum is all that is required to confirm membership. There is a template available on the website www.fnmnpc.ca
- There are no membership fees. Members benefit from FNMPC's services and have opportunities to participate in the governance of the organization
